#### LOGGER TRAINING AND USE OF TRAINED LOGGERS

LOGGERS PLAY CRITICAL ROLE ON THE GROUND – KEY COMPONENT OF SFI PROGRAM SINCE 1995

FOREST MANAGEMENT STANDARD – Objective 13
FIBER SOURCING STANDARD – Objective 3
FIBER SOURCING STANDARD – Objective 6

Enhancements add structure to the qualified logging professional (QLP) training requirements, raise quality and impact of logger training, and strengthen requirement to use QLPs.

#### MASTER LOGGER

An individual who completes the MLP course curriculum, holds a valid first aid card and pays required course registration fees as follows: \$140 for WCLA, Inc. members; \$480 for non-members. In addition, non-WCLA, Inc. members will be required to pay a service fee of \$175 per year (\$100 per year for tree farmers). To maintain MLP certified status, continuing education is required.


#### **CONTINUING EDUCATION**

To maintain MLP status, each participant is required to earn at least 8 credit hours of continuing education prior to the expiration of the initial two-year accreditation period and at least 8 credit hours every year thereafter.





Logger training is a component of the Sustainable Forestry Initiative's certified Fiber Sourcing Standard, which sets expectations for responsible procurement of all fiber and is audited by an independent third party. Loggers who received training are more likely to implement BMPs during harvesting operations on nonindustrial private forests."

#### **QUALIFIED LOGGING PROFESSIONAL DEFINED**

The **WA SIC** defines a Qualified Logging Professional (QLP) as an individual who has completed the WCLA Curriculum as follows:

## MASTER LOGGING PROFESSIONAL (MLP):

32 hour CORE training with a valid First aid card and 8 hours of C.E. per year after initial 2 year period. Must be in good standing with WCLA

#### ON SITE SUPERVISOR (OSS):

An individual who is directly supervised by an individual that is a current WCLA Master Logging Professional and has completed the Forest Practices Act and first aid sections of the MLP curriculum and has completed four (4) hours of related training in each subsequent year.

Master Logger – An individual who completes the MLP CORE curriculum and holds a valid first aid card. After initial 2 year period you MUST complete 8 hours of Continuing Education credits each year. Non-WCLA, Inc. members will be required to pay a service fee of \$175 per year to maintain MLP certified status.

- Forest With Exceptional Conservation Value (FEVC)
  - a. Are you familiar with what a FEVC is?

Critically imperiled (G1) and imperiled (G2) species and ecological communities.

#### **CRITICALLY IMPERILED G1**

A plant or animal rare or, because of some factor(s), especially vulnerable to extinction.

#### **IMPERILED G2**

At high risk of extinction or elimination due to restricted range, few populations or occurrences, steep declines, severe threats, or other factors.
