Forest Owners Field Day, Cle Elum, WA, June 21, 2025

Describe project or event activities:

The Field Day is an “out in the woods” experience for people who own and manage forest land, typically 5 – 5,000 acres. Because small forest owners have diverse values and manage land for multiple objectives, this event provides a spectrum of topics that results in more good forest stewardship on the ground. The most popular topics include forest thinning, forest health, wildlife habitat, managing a successful timber sale, and wildfire hazard mitigation. In June of 2025, topics featured at the Field Day were:

- Small-Scale Forestry Demonstrations (self-loader log truck with innovative winch extending from log grapple; tractors and implements; power and hand tools, and; small-scale yarding machinery).
- Bark Beetles and Defoliators
- Chainsaw Safety and Maintenance (2hrs)
- Common Noxious Weeds and Their Control
- Critter-Cams: Seeing Wildlife with Trail Cameras
- Forest and Rangeland Security and Safety
- Forest Health
- Forest Wildlife and Their Habitats
- Landowner Assistance Programs
- Pile Burning Tips, Tricks, and Rules
- Protecting Your Forest and Home from Wildfire
- Realities of Selling Timber: Working with Consulting Foresters: Forest Management Plans
- Regulatory Issues and Assistance
- Root Rot Identification and Management
- Site Prep, Reforestation, and Early Plantation Care
- Thinning and Pruning
- Tree and Shrub Identification
- Understanding Fish Habitat, Wetlands, and the Family Forest Fish Passage Program
- Wildlife Habitat Enhancements

Non-industrial Private Forest Owners (aka “Family Forest Owners”) were the target audience. Most own between 5 – 5,000 acres, with mean parcel size of 45 acres. Most landowners are absentees, primarily living in western WA Puget Sound – Metro area. The Field Day gave residents and non-resident owners alike a chance to gain valuable knowledge and to unite with professional foresters who can help them accomplish their near- and long-term objectives.
